As Executive Director of Impact Teen Drivers, she aims to increase awareness of the dangers of reckless and distracted driving so that young people make better decisions behind the wheel -whether as drivers or passengers-to keep our roads safe for everyone. Her strength in working across the spectrum of stakeholders forwards the discussion, promotes a unified message and evidence-based practices to tackle the number one killer of teens in America. Using a multi-faceted approach to change the driving culture to one that is distraction-free, Dr. Browning and Impact Teen Drivers hope to save thousands of lives needlessly lost on our roadways every year.



# KEYNOTE: THE PRIMARY COLORS OF A LEADER

Mary's interest in and love of leadership began as a member of the Future Farmers of America organization. Through the California Association of FFA she spent one year serving as an intern with the California Department of Education. In this year Mary conducted workshops, trainings and conferences alongside her five other teammates.

Among speaking with legislators, administrators, and educators, Mary and her team traveled to over 300 high schools speaking and conducting workshops for the 83,000 members of the California FFA Association. Mary now serves on the Growing Leaders team helping schools to best implement their Leadership programs.

She has partnered with organizations ranging from the National Football League Player Engagement, to NCAA Conferences, Division I University Athletic Departments and and High Schools. Her work has been seen on CNN, Fox & Friends, and in Forbes, The Huffington Post, and Psychology Today.

Mary will engage students and challenge them to step into their roles as leaders. Primary Colors of a Leader is a globally recognized formula for leadership and is broken down into the following 4 categories: Character, Perspective, Courage, Favor.
