Our **Conrad FCCLA** chapter has had a great year full of fun events, community service projects, and fundraisers. We did a couple of different fundraisers which include, Easter eggs (we filled and delivered easter eggs for kids to their houses), Turkey Trot (a fundraiser for the food pantry), and making pies. We also had fun doing some community service projects such as helping set up and serve dinner for people at a couple of different events. Then we also had to clean up after the event was over. We even got really good meals out of it. We have strived to make our FCCLA chapter become a family through interactive games at our meetings. We also held a Christmas party to help make the chapter closer. We held a meeting about learning the creed and had members memorize the creed to win certain toppings on their ice cream sundae. Overall, Conrad FCCLA has had an amazing year and we are looking forward to what this new year hold.

Throughout the past year Three Forks FCCLA has worked on several projects including our 18th annual Sub for Santa project which provided Christmas gifts and a Holiday food box for three families in need in the Three Forks Community. Our chapter also received funds from Montana FCCLA. Youth Service of America, and the Montana Department of Transportation for our traffic safety project and "Drive Like a Ninja" and for our Student Body project "Share the Love." A gardening project "Grow A Row" provided over 100 pounds of pumpkins. squash and cucumbers to the Headwaters Food Pantry. FCCLA members built floats for the rodeo parade in July and the homecoming parade in October. Five members represented Montana at NLC in San Diego this past summer. Three Forks received recognition for the Fifth Grade Finance National Program conducted by Carey Hansen. Culinary students prepared a buffet of hors d'oeuvres for members of the classified staff in May to thank them for their support of our school and all they do throughout the year.





Wibaux kicked off the FCCLA year at NLC in San Diego, with 12 members attending. When school started, so did their membership campaign which included an ice cream social and games with the incoming seventh graders. Fall activities included lots of fundraising, including a fun and profitable rummage sale, and planning the District Leadership Kickoff. The chapter worked with other school and community organizations to organize a Fall Festival in October and the Community Christmas Trees in December. Chapter members assisted with the 4-H Cloverbud afterschool program for 5 weeks, leading activities and games. The chapter also worked with Spanish Club and FFA to host 3 food drive events, and hosted a community work day to make pillowcases for area children in foster care. The year has also been fun - tie dying chapter t-shirts, recognizing Members of the Month, movie nights with FFA, and a prize auction based on points earned throughout the year.



Plentywood


The Plentywood FCCLA chapter did a whole lot of service to help make our community stronger this year. We recruited new members with a bowling night to kick start the year. We raised money for treatment travel expenses at our Pink Out night in October for local residents who are fighting cancer. Our efforts raised \$3,700 in one night! We helped our District 8 president, Lizzi Wiens, prepare for the Fall Leadership Rally where we learned IncREDible things about mental health. In December we held a bake sale where we raised money for Wildcat Wishes which buys Christmas gifts for families struggling financially in our school. We had a great time at "Game Night" at the Pioneer Manor in Plentywood where some of our Senior Citizens live. We chose this age group for our State Outreach Project as the winter months can be depressing for those who can't get out due to the weather. We are hosting the Arrive Alive tour on distracted driving for our student body on February 22, 2023. We have law enforcement coming in to talk on distracted driving prior to the simulator. We've had an incredible year serving others and learning with our student body about safety.

Beaverhead FCCLA was able to finish out the 2021-2022 school vear on a high note. Members hosted a school wide Easter Egg Hunt in April 2022 to celebrate all of the students at BCHS. Students also participated in some local community service projects. Beaverhead FCCLA started off the 2022/2023 school year with a band! We had a areat recruiting year and increased our membership from 52 to 72! Members helped raised funds by selling hot coco at football games and selling Martinson's Candy. All money earned from four fundraisers went back to purchase Christmas gifts for our local Giving Tree and putting together seven Thanksgiving Food baskets for BCHS Families. Beaverhead FCCLA also sponsored Montana Crunch Time and bought all of the apples for the BCHS students to take part in the annual event. Beaverhead FCCLA attended our District 11 meeting in Butte with 52 members in attendance. Jacob Harvev our chapter president ran for District 11 President and won!!! Beaverhead FCCLA was able to obtain two grants through MDT and put on our annual Vision Zero Week. Students helped organize committees and create events for the entire week. Students helped with the Arrive Alive Simulator and games, seatbelt checks, prize giveaways, reading statistics and pledging to not drive distracted.





The **Forsyth** chapter started with an officer retreat to creat a program of work. Members worked their way from Potential Leader, Leader in Training, Leader to Watch to Ultimate Leader. The need for chapter funds through a monthly Bake sale, Crunchy Munchy, Bag Sales and Hee Haw! Chapter projects included: member recruitment, Competitive Events, Skill Events, chapter office, running for District office. Points were earned working the Crunchy Munchy, participation in service events, committee work and various fundraisers. Service entailed maintaining a weekend meals backpack program, celebrating a Fright Night Halloween & Locker Lovers. They wrote a grant for the Martin Luther King Day of Service and made 150 book bags for patron at the county library, focusing on mental health of their entire community. Articles and events were posted on social media and in the local paper. These chapter members were bravely stepping into an IncREDible year.



Stevensville FCCLA has been busy promoting FCCLA and its purpose to the community and School District. The school year started with a meeting to discuss the goals for the 22-23 school year. Students gave many wonderful ideas about community service and how to publicize FCCLA. Activities during the year have included teaming up with SHS Student Council to do a food drive fundraiser and supply the local pantry partners with the donations. A tie Blanket Service project was planned to give blankets to the local Stevensville Police department. Students were able to travel to Deer Lodge in November for the District 6/7 fall meeting and network with other schools in the area. During FCCLA Week in February students decided they wanted to treat their amazing teachers to a taco luncheon made by them. Stevensville FCCLA has caring and thoughtful students who want to make a difference in their community.

Fergus FCCLA hit the ground running before school started with an officer retreat. Led by our enthusiastic chapter officer team, the goal for the year was member recruitment, consistent engagement and FUN. Fergus FCCLA exceeded our membership recruitment goal in the early fall. We held consistent meetings and ensured the chapter gathered for service and fun monthly including a Christmas baking party to raise funds to pay off school lunch debts. Fergus FCCLA enjoyed helping to plan and attend the first joint District 1 & 3/9 Fall Leadership Kickoff in Great Falls - the energy was contagious! Baking became our signature fundraiser, and FCCLA Week included a school wide carnival. Travel was a big part of the year with Ms. Vincent and State Officer Ellie Fulbright embracing all leadership opportunities including the National Fall Conference and the Montana ACTE Rotunda Legislative Event. It has been an IncREDible year!






