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STAR EVENTS By Emma Harrison VP of Competitive Events

Are you thinking about a STAR Event Project? Well I am! There are more than 30 STAR Events to choose from. You or your advisor will need to log into the fcclainc.org website and download the Competitive Events Guide to check out all the options and requirements. Once you have looked at the STAR Events, read all of the requirements, and selected the project you want to do, it's time to look at the planning process.

The planning process can be found on FCCLA's website at fcclainc.org. The planning process is a required step in all STAR Event projects.

The first step of the planning process is to identify concerns. This is where you need to show why your project is important to you or the community. Once you have identified the concern and reason for your project, you set a goal.

Goals should be SMART. Specific - How will your project address the concern you identified? Measurable - How will you measure whether you reached your goal or not? Attainable - Is it challenging, but not so difficult that you can't be successful? Relevant - Why does it matter? (tie back to concerns) Timely - You need an end date to fulfill your goal that is before the State Leadership Conference. After you know what your goal is you can start thinking about how you are going to carry out your project and your goal by forming a plan.

In the plan, you will specify the details of what you plan to do for your project: Who, What, When, Where, How. There are two more steps after form a plan that you will complete at the end of your project.

When you have completed your project, you will fill in the Act portion of the planning process, where you will describe very briefly what you did. Then in the Follow Up section you will evaluate if you were successful and what you would do differently. The planning process is a crucial part of your STAR Event, but it is also meant to be BRIEF. It can't be more than 1 page in total length. If done correctly, someone should be able to look at it and have a pretty good idea of how to run this project.

DISTRICT 6/7 MEETING

District 6/7 will be holding its district meeting on October 24th. It will be at The Rialto, in Deer Lodge, MT. Starting at 9am, and ending around 2pm, our meeting will have FIVE different workshops, along with a local speaker focusing on smart and safe spending. Our five workshops will be STAR Events, Strategic Planning,

Financial Fitness, one based on Traffic and Driver safety, and a fun Surprise one! We even have a fun theme this year! Our theme is Neon party! There will be goodie bags with gifts for each chapter that attends. Also, don't forget that we will be electing a new District President. I can't wait to see everyone there, and meet any new FCCLA members!



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Montana is currently ranked 29/50 states in terms of financial literacy access (source: Montana Office of Public Instruction). Improved education results in better financial options for Montana individals and families.

Although the Class of 2026 is required to complete a financial literacy course before graduation, Montana FCCLA has the tools ready now to teach others about earning, spending, saving, and protecting their finances.

Chapters can apply for mini-grants of \$200 to help chapters develop and implement projects to help others better understand financial management. Chapters completing the final report about their efforts are eligible to win cash awards of \$500, \$300 or \$200! Chapters may also apply to receive FREE Financial Fitness curriculum! 

2023-24 Membership Affiliation Options

This includes three packages that allow <u>Perkins Funding</u> as payment to mitigate chapter fundraising and individual payment participation barriers for students and families, along with an option exclusively for middle-level chapters, serving students up to grade 9.



LONG-TERM BENEFITS FOR THE TOP 25 AND BIG SKY PACKAGES

- Chapter Benefits: Montana CTE funding provides \$400 for existing chapters + a per-member allocation. Increased 2023-24 membership will increase your 2024-25 CTE funding allocation.
- State Benefits: House Bill 86 funding, which comprises most of FCCLA state funding, is heavily based on membership. Increased statewide membership means additional funding to support chapter advisers and provide student leadership opportunities.
