




National ProStart Competition

Belgrade High School represented the state of Montana at the National ProStart Invitational in Baltimore earlier this month. The competition was fierce, but the community of chefs, students, industry partners, advisors, and judges was so strong! The culinary team showcased their skills on Saturday morning, while the management team presented on Sunday. In between their own competition times, our students were able to check out dishes and restaurant concepts created by other states, network with industry leaders, take advantage of the Coca-Cola lounge area, sight-see in Baltimore, enjoy a fine dining experience at a fabulous restaurant, attend opening and closing general sessions, indulge in a private viewing of Ratatouille, and even participate in a ProStart Prom! Less glamorous parts of the trip included running around in the rain, packing and hauling all equipment and ingredients to and from hotels, and doing dishes in the hotel tub! Overall, the Montana Culinary team ranked 33rd and the Management team ranked 45th out of all the participating states.

BEEF! It's What's For Lunch!

Hi everyone my name is Lexie Wichman and I am an incoming senior at Moore High School, as well as your 2025-26 Montana FCCLA State President. During my sophomore year of high school I set off on a mission to create a beef donation program for my school where local ranchers could



donate their beef to our school to be served for lunch. This program soon gained the name "BEEF It's What's For Lunch". I decided that this would be a perfect start to my FCCLA STAR Event project for the year, and learned that this program fit perfectly into the Public Policy Advocate STAR project guidelines. With this project, I earned first place at the State FCCLA Conference and first place at the 2024 FCCLA National Leadership Conference in Seattle, Washington.

Creating a Beef to School Program can seem like a daunting challenge, but it is well worth the time and effort the startup takes. If you are interested in starting your own Beef-to-School Program within your school, your first step is to talk to your school administrator. He or she will be one of your biggest partners in this program, so it is important to gain their support. From there, you will work with your administration to communicate with school food service providers, who are your cooks. The food service providers will be able to give you more information about how much beef your school would need on a daily basis. With this information, you will then be able to bring your ideas to your school board trustees. If you receive the board's support, you will work with the board members to find a USDA-certified processing facility, create donor applications, and form a plan on how to make this program best fit your school.



The coolest thing about creating a Beef-to-School Program is that every school has the ability to make it unique to their school to ensure it fits their needs. Something as small as the meat you are eating at lunch time may seem like an unimportant part of your school, but the impact real local meat has on a meal is unbelievable. I implemented this program over a year ago in my school, and still hear students and staff talking about how delicious our school lunches are to this day.

So, if you are ready to make a difference in your school, I encourage you to look into creating your own Beef-to-School Program.
