



After all, one;s career choice impacts so many areas of their lifestyle and their future! The Montana FCCLA State Outreach Project for 2025-26 is Career Connection, which means your chapters have so many opportunities to encourage career exploration and preparation in your local communities. Montana FCCLA chapters are eligible to receive a copy of the FCCLA National Program Career Connection, full of engaging activities to help chapters as they work to peer educate others about the importance of career preparation for a stronger future. Chapters are also encouraged to apply for mini-grants of up to \$200 to support community outreach projects designed to impact career exploration and preparation in local communities. Be sure to complete your State Outreach Project report by March 1 so that your chapter can showcase their Career Connection efforts and earn recognition. #### Vision Zero



Traffic safety is an issue that impacts everyone. Montana FCCLA and the Montana Department of Transportation have been partnering for years in an effort to include members in local traffic safety efforts. Our partnership continues into the 2025-26 year, with Vision Zero grants, awards, and presentations. Look for the Vision Zero workshops at your District Meetings, where chapters can learn the basics about implementing a successful chapter project! Chapter leaders will also learn more about this incredible opportunity at the Fall Leadership Rally. Watch for the Vision Zero Toolkit for Chapters coming soon! Funding for projects is available, with a priority deadline of November 14 and a final deadline of December 5. After completing your project, be sure to submit the final report by March 1 to be eligible for state-level awards.

#### **Sharing Career Connection in Your Community**



You might already know the 2025-26 Montana FCCLA State Outreach Project focus is Career Connection, but how does that translate to a community outreach project? Consider using some of these ideas (or a combo of them) as inspiration to help your FCCLA chapter develop a local community outreach project that not only helps members prepare for career success, but also helps those in the community also become better prepared!

The Career Connection program is divided into four components: My Skills, My Life, My Career and My Path. Consider these project ideas in each of the areas:ction units and career readiness skills:

#### **My Skills** – Building Personal Strengths & Workplace Readiness

- Elementary "Career Skills Carnival": FCCLA members set up simple booths (teamwork puzzle, communication game, time management race) for younger students to help them develop career-ready skills at an early age...
- Senior Center Tech Helpers: Teach older adults how to use devices while practicing patience, communication, and teaching skills.
- Community Job-Readiness Fair: FCCLA members host mock interviews, resume review stations, and customer service role-plays for peers.

#### My Career - Understanding the World of Work

- Job Shadow Highlights: Students shadow community members in various careers, then share presentations with elementary or middle school students.
- Career Fair Field Trip Arrange to visit local businesses and interview employees at each stop to learn about potential careers in the field and what skills employers are seeking.
- Career Stations in the Library: Set up interactive displays (tools, uniforms, sample tasks) for children and families to explore.

**My Life** – Balancing Roles in Careers, Families, and Communities

- Family Meal Planning Workshops: Students lead a session for families on planning healthy, affordable meals, connecting career readiness to family life.
- Intergenerational Storytelling Night: Students invite older community members to share career/life balance stories, then reflect on lessons learned.
- Elementary Helpers Program: High school FCCLA members mentor younger students on balancing school, play, and responsibilities.

#### My Path - Planning for Career & Lifestyle Goals

- Vision Board Workshop: Students guide peers or younger students in making career and life goal boards using magazines, drawings, and quotes.
- Financial Literacy Basics: FCCLA members lead a session for middle school students on saving, budgeting, and planning for future goals.
- Career Show and Tell FCCLA members interview community members to learn about the path of their career, including training, opportunities for skill development and employment changes, then members conduct a "Show and Tell" to share what they learned about career evolution in their community.

No matter what project you choose to develop, all of these options are:

- Student-led, with leadership opportunities
- Low-cost (most supplies can be gathered from school, donations, or repurposed items)
- Community-focused, engaging children, peers, and older adults
- Directly tied to the Career Connection units and career readiness skills



When your chapter has some project plans underway, be sure to apply for a mini-grant on the Montana FCCLA website to help your project get off to a great start!


#### 2025-26 Membership Affiliation Options




